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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome to the 13th issue of the 2nd year of the President's News Digest.

I would like to start this issue by reminding our colleagues that their course portfolios for the last semester should have been completed by now and according to the QAAC template and they should have been produced up to the highest standards.



As I mentioned many times before, course portfolios are the starting points for any accreditation or programme reviews activities. They also reflect the quality of staff and students' work for a particular semester. The production of course portfolios should be seen as a systematic process to document course specifications, assessment, course expectations and reflections that help students achieve their learning outcomes. This is vital from a quality assurance and accreditation perspectives. It is a relatively simple process, but it should be done with care, dedication and professionalism. At the end of the day, we are talking about our students' futures. Soon, we will be auditing all course portfolios. The production of good course portfolios is a basic requirement in all universities.

On 23 January, the Chairman of the BOTs and the President together with senior colleagues from across the University received a big delegation from the University of Prince Songkla in Thailand headed by their

VP FOR ACADEMIC AFFAIRS AND DEVELOPMENT A GUEST ON BAHRAIN TV SHOW AL-RA'Y

NQF MAPPING WORKSHOP

Under the leadership of Dr. Radwan Kharabsheh, Director of the QAAC, the Centre organised an NQF Mapping Workshop on Thursday, 26 January 2017. The workshop was conducted by an expert on NQF. It is a series of workshops that will be conducted during the course of this academic year 2016/2017. This workshop targeted the Bachelor in Business Administration (BBA) programme, since it will be the first programme undergoing the actual mapping process.



The workshop was attended by approximately 25 people. Apart from faculty members under the BBA programme, selected faculty members from other colleges were also invited to attend the workshop. The Vice President for Academic Affairs and Development, Dr. Assem Al-Hajj also attended the workshop showing his continuous support.

The workshop was comprised of three parts:

- First part dealt with NQF in general Descriptors and levels.
- Second part dealt with the actual mapping process using examples presented during the workshop.
- Third part dealt with managing the process of NQF in ASU.

NQF Mapping has already started in ASU and is commencing with the BBA programme, but will be achieved incrementally by all departments in all colleges during this academic year 2016/2017. An expert on NQF will be joining the 'NQF Mapping Group' in one of its mapping exercises to ensure the adoption of best practices and the effectiveness of the mapping process in ASU.
