ASU's Chairman praises the achievement of the ISO International Certificate

The Board of Trustees reviews the achievements of the University

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Prof. Waheeb Ahmed Al-Khaja, stressed that the University is working hard to achieve the goals it has set since its establishment that reflect its strong desire to achieve the objectives of Bahrain's Economic Vision 2030. The Kingdom's wise leadership seeks to provide high quality education that improves the skills of Bahraini citizens and benefits the progress and development of the country. The University is keen to attain high standards in the field of higher education that will contribute to meeting the requirements and needs of the Bahraini labour market and is making steady progress and providing the best services to students.

Prof. Waheeb's comments were made during the fourth meeting of the Board of Trustees for the academic year 2017-2018, which was held in the presence of the Chairman of the Board Prof. Waheeb Al-Khaja, the President of the University Prof. Ghassan Aouad, and the members of the Board of Dr. Fatima Mohamed Al Balooshi; Dr. Fayez Hashim A. Latief Al-Sadah, Mr. Adel Abdulla Nass, Mr. Waleed Ahmed Al-Khaja, Mr. Ghazi Abdullah Nass, and Mr. Mohamed Yaqoob Al Aamer.

The Board reviewed the University's Strategic Plan to become a prestigious university within the region and the Arab world. The Board reviewed the report of achievements of the University's operational plan for the academic year 2017-2018, endorsed the University's operational plan for the year 2018-2019, and the progress made against the performance indicators. The Board also examined the University's preparedness for institutional accreditation, its international scientific research plan, as well as its risk register and operational plans for faculties and departments.

The members of the Board discussed the development of projects to establish a gym and parking areas in the near future. They also noted the proposal to establish a centre for academic development in cooperation with the Higher Education Academy (HEA, UK).

The Board congratulated all members of the university for obtaining the ISO International Certificate ISO 9001: 2015 in administrative work (providing administrative support to the University), noting this achievement is a further demonstration of the University moving in the right direction to provide high quality education through the adoption of national and international standards and development of plans and curricula in line with the requirements of the Higher Education Council.

Finally, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Prof. Waheeb Ahmed Al-Khaja expressed his happiness with the progress achieved by the University. The University President and members of the academic and administrative staff were praised for their hard work to serve and strengthen the University's position at the local and Gulf sectors. He also praised the University for creating all the appropriate conditions to provide high-quality education by upgrading student facilities and equipment in accordance with the standards of the academic accreditation system.

A new achievement on the road to excellence by obtaining the ISO certification for the ASU Quality Management



The Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Prof. Waheeb Al-Khaja, congratulated all the University's employees for obtaining the ISO International Certificate (ISO 9001: 2015) in Administrative Work for the administrative services of the University.

Prof. Waheeb said, in a speech to employees during the ceremony held by the University for the occasion, that this achievement aligns with ASU's strategic plan set for the coming period, which focuses on achieving quality programmes and specialisations. By providing an environment based on creativity and interaction, developing plans and curricula in line with the requirements of the Higher Education Council, and aligning with global developments, the needs of both regional and international communities can be met.

For his part, University President Prof. Ghassan Aouad said the University's ISO certification in administration is a considerable achievement and will be a great boost towards achieving institutional accreditation. He also thanked all the staff who contributed to this achievement.

Prof. Aouad noted that this achievement underscores the University's strong commitment to quality and the efficiency of its administrative staff, as well as their professionalism in carrying out their duties. The University considers its administrative staff as an essential support for its academic work and attaches great importance to the development and refinement of their skills through internal and external training, which will increase productivity and support the policy of motivating and retaining staff.

Dr. Mohammed Yousif, Vice President for Administration, Finance, and Community Engagement, also praised the efforts and diligence of ASU's administrative staff. Applied Science University reaches record number of fellowships and senior fellowships of the Higher Education Academy (UK)



During 2017/18 several more academics from the University received a fellowship from the Higher Education Academy (UK), bringing the total number of academic members from across the University holding a fellowship or senior fellowship to 35 faculty members (seven with Senior Fellowships and 29 with Fellowships).

Fellowship of the Higher Education Academy (UK) is a prestigious international recognition of high standards and commitment to teaching, learning and the student experience in the field of higher education. Working towards gaining fellowship equips faculty members with knowledge and skills that facilitate learning by training them in the latest methods and strategies in university teaching and evaluation.

This achievement is in line with the University's strategic objectives of providing the best educational service to its students. The faculty programme contributes to the development of academic and teaching skills and up-todate theories for teaching and learning, which is reflected in the quality of the educational experience they provide to students.



Prof. Ghassan Aouad, President of the University, expressed his happiness with the achievements, praising the importance of HEA recognition and its impact on the academic and professional life of the holder. The achievement of faculty members in gaining a fellowship will contribute to the development and improvement of the quality of education provided by the University. It will also support the University with international accreditation and enhance cooperation with international universities, especially as the University has launched new programmes in partnership with the London South Bank University (in Architectural Design and Civil & Construction Engineering) and Cardiff Metropolitan University (in Accounting & Finance and Management & Business Studies). Prof. Aouad said that the University looks forward to more of its academics pursuing professional recognition and certification. This is an indication of a university having advanced academic standing. He stressed that all academics at ASU have the experience and knowledge to qualify them in obtaining this recognition.

The University wins first place for the second year in a row in the "Ratel Al Quran" competition



Under the patronage of Dr. Farid bin Yaqoub Al-Muftah, Undersecretary of the Ministry of Justice and Islamic Affairs, the Applied Science University's Student Council held the 11th edition of the "Ratel Al Quran" competition for the best reading and recitation of the Holy Qur'an. The competition was attended by students from Bahrain's private and public universities, in the presence of the ASU President Prof. Ghassan Aouad, and a number of senior members of the University.

A total of 14 students from seven private and government universities participated in the competition. The final results were ASU's Mohammed Taha Al-Junaid winning first place, Ali Khaled Al-Awadhi from the Kingdom University winning second, and Yusra Salahuddin from RCSI Bahrain coming third.

The competition was supervised by an arbitration committee headed by Dr. Ahmed Atallah, from the Department of General Studies in ASU's College of Arts and Sciences, and Dr. Muwafaq Al-Dulaimi, Prof. Murad Al-Janabi, from the Department of Public Law in ASU's College of Law and Sheikh Khalil Al-Banashi, a reader in the Ministry of Justice and Islamic Affairs.

The Jury adopted several criteria in the selection of winners, including performance, proficiency in reading and reciting, the beauty of sound, interaction with verses, and how they begin and end.

It is worth mentioning that the competition aims to connect students to the Holy Quran and encourage them to memorize, recite, and instil in their hearts and minds its association to the intellectual and cultural formation of the Islamic Ummah, which will have a great impact on the souls of individuals and society. Continuing ASU's series of e-University systems... ASU launches its new e-student services system

Applied Science University launched the e-student services system, providing a variety of services that help to enhance a student's life at ASU and ensure easy contact with the administration. The system is directly linked with several University offices to guarantee student assistance as soon as possible and find appropriate solutions for them. The e-student services system comes within the context of the University's goal of maximising the use of technology to provide services to its students. Relying on innovative and sustainable solutions for the development of such systems meet the needs and aspirations of students and University staff. The e-service system also helps students find solutions to problems and submit suggestions electronically. It also enables students to follow up on





actions that have been taken until the query is finally addressed.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Prof. Waheeb Al-Khaja, stressed that the University spares no effort in developing students' skills and supporting them to achieve their objectives. He pointed out that the University considers the student as the centre of the educational process. ASU's mission is aimed at producing a generation of graduates capable of serving the community and supporting his/her country with the knowledge and experience gained while at the University. He also noted that the e-student services system is another step in achieving the University's vision of providing the best services to its students.

University President Prof. Ghassan Aouad said that the launch of the e-student services system is a qualitative addition to the services currently available at the University. He pointed out that this step comes as part of the University's endeavour to continuously develop and provide the highest level of services to its students. The new system comes as a complement to the series of electronic services that the University has previously launched in its efforts to transform to online processes.

Prior to launching this system for students, the University had launched a set of online systems including the Student Information System (SIS), the Human Resources and Payroll System, the Personnel Services System, the Decision Support System, the Procurement and Maintenance System, the Archiving System, the Academic Performance Appraisal System, the electronic entry gates system, and the room reservation system.

These systems were developed and designed internally by the Directorate of Information and Communication Technology and Knowledge Management, as part of a plan to unify all the University's departmental systems into a single system that meets international standards.

Prof. Ghassan Aouad highlights the most important technical and scientific requirements for the doctoral thesis completion

The President of Applied Science University, Prof. Ghassan Aouad, discussed the importance of scientific publishing for doctoral students' research and studies as not only an additional qualification, but also to benefit the scientific research community, the advanced skills in analysis and synthesis enable the solutions to problems and challenges in unconventional ways.

During this conference, the Prof. Aouad called on every PhD student or scholar to follow a rigorous plan for conducting their research, starting with identifying the subject of interest, reviewing previous literature on the subject, building hypotheses based on that review, and determining the sample of the research along with the stages of data collection, analysis, and validation.

Prof. Aouad presented a paper entitled "The Art and Science of Writing a Doctoral Dissertation, a PhD is a Journey of Discovery and Fun", during which he addressed a series of doctoral studies. He concluded that a series of key steps are important to create a strong doctoral thesis. In addition, during doctoral studies, a range of technical and scientific skills, including the spirit of passion, creativity, and the ability to write accurately and follow the scientific approach are needed for the research to flourish.

He also pointed out that answering the question of why you are pursuing this research should be the first and most fundamental question that a doctoral student poses to him/ herself. He also noted that conduct of scientific research requires scholars with skills and abilities of two different kinds: the first is the ability to expand scientific knowledge and the other is the researcher's personal literary and interactive capabilities.



The conference, which included 348 working papers and 50 posters, was attended by the Undersecretary of the Ministry of Education of the United Arab Emirates, the President of the British University in Dubai, the President of the American University of Sharjah, the Executive Vice President of the University of Sharjah, and many senior academics, together with a number of graduate students from the United Arab Emirates. Prof. Aouad was the sole guest speaker at the conference.

An ambitious plan to develop ASU's academic staff in line with international standards are led by a joint collaboration between the University and the Higher Education Academy (UK)



Establishing an accredited HEA centre at the University is a major step on a path to achieve the ambition of having 100% of the faculty members earn one of the categories of fellowship over the next four years.

Applied Science University seeks to provide the best educational service to its students. It constantly keeps up with the latest developments and modernizes its academic programmes in line with international standards and needs of the local labour market. In this regard, the University management is always keen to establish collaborations with universities and academic institutions that have a distinguished scientific reputation worldwide. One example of such collaboration is with the UK's Higher Education Academy (HEA).

The University believes its cooperation with the Academy will contribute to developing the skills of its academics. Acquiring theories and modern tools in the field of teaching and learning will be reflected in the quality of education that ASU provides. During the past few years, the University has worked to develop its faculty members and this initiative has seen a large number of them obtain a fellowship or senior fellowship from the Higher Education Academy (UK).

To talk about ASU's collaboration with the Higher Education Academy, its role in support of the educational process, and its impact on students and the quality of education, we met with Dr. Adel Al-Samman, Director of the Faculty Development Unit and Dr. Faiza Zitouni, Dean of Student Affairs and Acting Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs and Development.

The Higher Education Academy (UK) is an institution of excellence and prestige. It works in collaboration with governments, ministries, universities, and academics, in the UK and around the world and focuses on the UK Professional Standards Framework (UKPSF). Its criteria and three dimensions of Areas of Educational Activity, Core Knowledge, and Professional Values contributes to the value of higher education and the quality of the student experience.

What does the HEA Fellowship means and what features it add to its holder?

The Fellowship of the Higher Education Academy (UK) is an international recognition of professionalism in teaching and learning in higher education. Working towards achieving fellowship equips faculty members with the knowledge and skills that facilitate teaching and learning through training in the latest methods and strategies. ASU's HEA Centre and development programme are powerful aids to recruit faculty members with talents and abilities. HEA Fellowship means continuous improvement by raising the quality of teaching as a driver for students' success by acquiring key competencies and skills needed by the labour market. In addition, it supports higher education institutions in achieving strategic ambitions for shaping the future of university education.

The Academy will contribute to developing the skills of its academics, acquiring theories and modern tools in the field of teaching and learning



What are the implications of HEA Fellowship for the academic process and ASU students?

Higher Education Fellowship ensures individual and institutional commitment to professional teaching and learning. Across various categories, the Fellowship represents international recognition of the level of professional practice of staff in teaching and learning, academic leadership, and positive influence on co-workers and the institution. Achievement of HEA Fellowships by staff will contribute to the development and improvement of the quality of education provided by the University. It also helps in terms of international accreditation and cooperation with international universities, especially as the University has launched new programmes in cooperation with London South Bank University (Architectural Design Engineering and Civil and Construction Engineering) and Cardiff Metropolitan University (Accounting & Finance and Management & Business Studies). In addition, the process of obtaining the fellowship and developing/ documenting the skills it requires is for the betterment of the University, because these relate to design of educational programmes, student support, and evaluations of various kinds, providing appropriate education environment and engaging in ongoing professional development processes.

Is there a plan for the University to develop more members of the faculty to seek this recognition in the future?

There is an ambitious plan by the University management for all faculty members to achieve a Higher Education Academy Fellowship over the next four years. We have already qualified 25 to 30% of faculty members who now have either fellowship or senior fellowship. This has been achieved through three approaches: application directly to the Higher Education Academy after staff development activity at ASU, sending faculty members to joint development programmes with the University of Bahrain, or sending faculty to the preparation programmes of the Bahraini Higher Education Council.

An agreement between the University and Higher Education Academy has been signed and an HEA Centre has been recently opened within the University. What is the importance of this?

As part of our strategic partnership with the Higher Education Academy (UK), the University has opened a fellowship centre for professional development of faculty and administrators associated with the educational process, to support their application for fellowship in one of three categories: Associate Fellowship (AFHEA), Fellowship (FHEA), or Senior Fellowship (SFHEA). Some of the benefits that accrue to the University from the establishment of the HEA Fellowship Centre can be summarized in the following points:

- A step on the path of achieving ASU's ambition of having 100% of the faculty members earn one of the categories of fellowship over the next four years.
- Upgrading the capabilities of the academic staff at the University in line with international standards, enabling them to obtain an internationally-known standard recognition for their teaching and academic practice, and raising the quality of outputs of higher education in the University.
- The Centre is an effective tool for the University to obtain a return on investment in terms of the development of its faculty, by involving staff who have achieved fellowship in the operation of the Centre and development of future applicants.
- The Centre helps to prepare and train not only academics, but also members of the administrative body directly or indirectly associated with the educational process.
- It develops a culture of teaching and learning across the University.
- The Centre is the nucleus for the preparation of more academic development programmes at the University rather than sending members of the faculty outside for this purpose.

Achievements, activities, scientific and creative projects of the students



ASU's First Student Research Conference (SRC) 50 students presented 28 research papers and graduation projects

Under the patronage of Chairman of the Board of Trustees Prof. Waheeb Al-Khaja and the President of the University Prof. Ghassan Aouad, the Deanship of Scientific Research and Graduate Studies organised the first Student Research Conference (SRC) in the presence of the President of the University, Deans of Colleges, Dean of Student Affairs, academic and administrative staff of the University, and ASU students.

At the conference, 50 students presented 28 research papers and graduation projects in a variety of fields, covering information technology, health, society, education, design, advertising, and many other topics.

The aim of the conference is to encourage students' research and innovation and enhance ASU's research culture by creating an environment conducive to increasing student participation in the full range of academic activities. The conference also aims to present research and innovations that will benefit society and lead to opportunities to transform these into community-based projects for dissemination at local and international levels.

Prof. Waheeb said that prominent research leaders are produced by highlighting and refining their talents, building bridges of scientific communication between them, providing them with a range of academic and personal skills, and strengthening values of cooperation, competition, and academic integrity, all while contributing to society. Prof. Aouad expressed his pleasure at the high standard of the students, reflecting the quality of education they received at the University. He said the students showed impressive creativity and skill in presenting and discussing their research in front of the audience.

Prof. Aouad explained the conference is an opportunity to highlight the skills and talents of ASU's students. He pointed out that contemporary educational approaches use several measures to judge the success of educational institutions, and that institutions have the ability to influence their students' lives significantly by developing their knowledge and skills in various fields, and thereby building future generations equipped with the necessary intellectual and academic attributes.

Prof. Aouad added that the conference was also inspired by the strategy of the Higher Education Council in emphasizing the importance of research to universities. The University's vision focuses on developing the students' research skills and committing to applying the highest standards of academic quality by providing higher education programmes that produce highly-capable students who are able to compete in the labour market and serve their communities and countries.



Green Architecture Project...

Creativity of University students demonstrates the future and importance of Clean Energy



Creativity is an important marker along the scale of evolution of civilisations and reflects the stage in the development of humankind where art meets thought, beauty, and perfection. These qualities are the highest created by human thought and are much sought after in an era that is witnessing the acceleration of technological development facilitating human life with little regard to the environment. Green architecture is one of the most important innovations created by humans. The term describes developing buildings that do not affect the environment negatively, but instead employ environment-friendly approaches like solar energy, wind power, hydro power, and many related technologies.

The topic of clean energy and green buildings is of key importance today, so ASU Life talked to students Ahmed Yousef Ahmed Al-Qahtan, Ibrahim Ali Qaid Mohammed Bujairi, and Mohammed Noor Daij Al-Shomali from Accounting and Finance, whose project highlighted the importance of the ASU campus as a building based on clean energy, the first and one of the most prominent in the Kingdom of Bahrain.

Where did you get the idea for your Green Architecture project, which you called ASU Green Building?

The idea began when we joined the University. The aim of our project was to make a model of the campus using our various skills and our practical experience in industry. We met each other in two courses: Methods of Scientific Research under the supervision of Dr. Faiza Zitouni and Cost Accounting under the supervision of Dr. Iyad Al- Sartawi.

Our idea was to make a simple model for cost accounting including the collection of costs to be used for the project, including materials and terms and research methods. The idea was then discussed with Dr. Faiza Zitouni after which we added some methods of electricity generation from natural sources. We planned how the University could benefit from focusing on alternative energy (solar energy), recycling of waste (paper, plastic cans, etc.), and recycling of waste water for use in plant irrigation.

How did you plan to implement the idea and turn it into reality?

The idea was formed at the beginning of the semester and the development process took a full semester because we worked in great detail on the study. The initial idea became a reality as we started by taking pictures of campus details and drawing mini-

designs over them to indicate the addition of renewable energy sources. We used hand sculpted raw materials like wood, iron, clay, etc.

After the designs were completed, the solar panels were added. The energy conversion system from the panels was configured and stored in batteries for electrical use. Under the supervision of technicians specialized in the field of alternative energy, the details of the electrical consumption of the model made it possible to conduct a comprehensive study concerning the implementation of the project.

How much did the University management cooperate with you? Did you have facilities and support to implement the project?

We received full support and encouragement from the University management to complete and implement this project. The idea was a first of its kind in student coursework or project activities. We documented the project with pictures through all stages until its completion.

Do you think that Bahrain and Arab communities need more awareness about green architecture?

We believe clean energy is a very important issue, because it is the future of energy in the world. Therefore, raising awareness of it in the Arab world is necessary to increase interest in renewable energy, especially as we live in an area with all the necessary resources to implement this energy in real life. The cost and production of renewable energy is also much less than the cost of generating electricity through oil and natural gas.

The United Kingdom's income from the education sector for 2014-2015 was around 95 billion pounds and it generated 940 thousand jobs. The endless possibilities provided by IT should be harnessed to achieve sustainable economic, social, and environmental development. Capacity-building is the only means of promoting competitiveness, increasing economic growth and generating serious employment opportunities. This is of particular importance as many countries around the world are considering the issue of sustainability and alternative energy and developing national frameworks to implement strategies in this regard.

From his side, President of the Conference and of the Applied Science University Prof. Ghassan Aouad said the recommendations issued by the conference will have implications for the scientific research strategy and academic decisions of the University. The conference aims to enhance a scientific research culture in line with the strategy of the Higher Education Council for scientific research decision makers, experts, researchers and PhD students. It will contribute to the development of training, scientific research, and innovation for young people and researchers enhancing their academic and research capabilities in the field of sustainable development.

He stressed creating a culture of sustainability in schools by teaching students the importance of preserving the environment.

Enhancement of the role and function of general and higher education, especially in the field of human development, by building national capacities, trainings, and skills for the twentyfirst century. Rashid Sanad Najm is a third-year student of Accounting and Finance. He is also a player of the Bahrain Table Tennis team, the West Asian Youth Champion, the Gulf Youth Champion, the Arab Junior Champion, the Bahrain Champion for several successive seasons, and the only champion of both Bahraini Table Tennis Championships.

In this issue of University Life Magazine, Rashid discusses what it is like being a distinguished world champion with countless achievements.

Describe how you felt the moment you won gold in the West Asian Championship.

The feeling is indescribable. I put in mind the goal to honor the Kingdom of Bahrain and give my utmost effort in maintaining my position as the best player in West Asia. I cannot deny the competition was strong. I had to focus and give double the effort to harvest these titles. I returned to Bahrain — thanks to God — with three medals, gold in the individual youth category, silver in the



young men category, and finally bronze in the men's singles category.

I dedicate this medal to the country's leadership represented by His Majesty King Hamad bin Isa Al Khalifa, His Royal Highness Prince Khalifa bin Salman Al Khalifa, Prime Minister and His Royal Highness Prince Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa, Crown Prince and the First Deputy Prime Minister. "Gold is worth only gold" to my beloved Bahrain.

What is the difference between competition in local tournaments and continental championships?

International competitions give you the opportunity to compete against people with higher levels of experience and professionalism. Competition outside earns more experience and requires you to be at the top of your game. This does not mean local championships are not very competitive; there are Bahraini players with high capabilities. The local tournaments are important too in supporting Bahraini athletes and improving local sports.

How do you evaluate the tournament and the performance of its

participants?

As mentioned earlier, it is considered one of the largest tournaments in West Asia and includes the best Arab and Middle East players.

The final match was one of the toughest games I had. I was ahead 3-0 and the Saudi player managed to equalize the score 3-3 and reach the break. Thankfully, I was able to settle down, continue to play strongly, and ultimately win.

How do you balance study and sports as a player of the Bahraini Table Tennis team?

I set a table that arranges time between study and sports so as to not have one affect the other. I also like to acknowledge the role of the University in encouraging me by providing facilities that help in maintaining my academic achievements. My participation in sports events along with the University's cooperation help raise the name of the Kingdom of Bahrain.

The competition emerged from the aspiration of the University management to enhance ASU's educational offering and develop academic delivery skills

The Creative Teacher Competition: a modern vision of teaching and creativity in lecture methods

The management of Applied Science University is very keen to continue to improve ASU's educational offering through all its plans and strategies. Part of this involves developing all aspects of the skills of its academics to guarantee maximum benefits for students and thereby ensure the graduation of qualified individuals for the labour market. The University uses modern methods and technology in lecture delivery to increase interaction and participation of students and teachers in the educational process.

The University has always supported the creative ideas of its teaching staff and emphasizes the importance of creating a culture of excellence in teaching. Aligning the content of lectures and professional techniques with the philosophy of modern education, the learner is prioritized through educational and research projects, which encourage them to adopt modern educational methods and improve their academic performance and research activities. This is reflected in the quality of the educational process provided to students, guaranteeing the University's ability to provide education of high quality.

Based on this approach, organising the Creative Teacher Competition comes within the context of steps taken by the University to improve in line with international standards. Sharing good experiences among University faculty contributes to enhancing the outcomes of the educational process, and has positive impact on students.

University Life talked to the chairman of the committee supervising the competition, Prof. Murad Al-Janabi, concerning the criteria used for determining the winners.





Prof. Murad Al-Janabi

What are the criteria for evaluating faculty members and nominating winners?

The faculty members at the University were graded through six categories of varying importance. The grades given added up to 100%, with the winner getting the most points. The aspects and their respective contribution to the selection of the creative teacher award winners are as follows:

- 1. Performance in the ASU Good Teaching Conference (GTC) contributed 30%. The evaluation is the one previously carried out by the organisers of the GTC in 2017/18.
- Creative and innovative thinking in teaching contributed 20%. An article (max 500 words) showing the teacher's philosophy of creative and innovative teaching on the course he/she teaches is evaluated by the Office of the Vice-President.
- 3. The teacher's course portfolio contributed 20%. This is evaluated by the ASU Quality Assurance & Accreditation Centre.
- 4. Peer evaluation contributed 10%. This is done through peer assessment reports in the classroom.
- 5. Students' performance contributed 10%. This is evaluated through the University website.
- 6. University management contributed 10%. This is evaluated by the departments, deanships, and senior management of the University.

How do you evaluate this experience? Do you recommend repeating it in the future?

I am immensely pleased with the effectiveness of the University management, especially with Dr. Assem Al-Hajj, Vice President for Academic Affairs & Development, in his consistent attention to detail involving the principle of justice in participation. I also acknowledge Prof. Ghassan Aouad, President of the University, in honouring the winners and his role in motivating and inspiring the teaching staff of the institution to compete and persevere in working for the highest scientific quality.

The patronage of Prof. Waheeb Al-Khaja, Chairman of the Board

of Trustees, had great impact on the success of the event. He emphasized the principle of fair competition and worked to consolidate the honour of the creative teacher. We are all in favour of repeating this experience and developing it in educational institutions in the Kingdom of Bahrain and abroad.

How long did the evaluation take? How many participants were there?

124 faculty members participated in the event which lasted for two whole months from April to June 2018. The Committee held 10 periodic meetings where the results were collected confidentially by the Vice President. It was then announced in an award ceremony after obtaining the approval of the Ministry of Education.

Dr. Moaiad Khder

Dr. Moaiad Khder won first place in the competition. He is the Head of the Department of Computer Science in the College of Arts & Science. He is a specialist in database and software engineering. He holds a PhD in computer science from the National University of Malaysia and has more than 15 years of scientific and practical experience. Dr. Moayad published a series of specialized research in programming and computer science.

Describe how you felt after winning first place in this year's Creative Teacher Competition.

The competition was a great gesture by the University management and the ASU President, Prof. Aouad. They were keen to raise the spirit of friendly competition among members of the academic body in participating in the event. I have mixed feelings of joy and pride about coming first in the Creative Teacher Competition for the academic year 2017-2018. I have a new sense of motivation to deliver what is best and to be more distinguished and creative in the future.

What are the ideal lecture standards?

The ideal lecture depends on many elements, the most important of which are:

• Sincerity and taking into account that God Almighty looks at

what you offer. Also a good amount of time for preparating the lecture and lesson plan. This includes preparation of the lecture aids, the timeline of lessons and activities, and the methods of assessment and teaching. Always attending the lecture on time. Preparing students for the lecture and their participation. Ensuring the achievement of the objectives of the lecture. Diversification in methods of presenting lectures. Distribution of attention to all students and avoiding lack of focus on a particular destination.

There are many other things that are learnt through training, experience, and class visits to colleagues.

• The first and most important principle in the educational process is to reach the student so he/she can learn. The student may need to see his/her teacher as a father, brother, mother, sister, or friend to feel sincerity. The best teachers build a bridge of trust between him/herself and the student.





• The second principle is to make the students aware of the importance of gaining knowledge before granting a degree. Obtaining a university degree is important, but my task is to make this certificate or degree granted strong and deserving.

• The third principle is to encourage every positive in the student and try to lessen his/her negatives.

• Finally, the fourth principle is the catalyst for creativity and innovation. I consider the best teachers my students. Smart diligent students increase your innovation to suit them and weak students challenges your creativity in being able to inform him as well as you do a smart student.

Ms. Manal Al-Matrook

Ms. Manal Al-Matrook won second place in the competition. She is a lecturer in Department of Business Administration in the College of Administrative Sciences. She holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Bahrain in 2004 and a Master's degree from Malaysia Open University in 2008. She is a member of the Bahrain Development and Training Society (BSTD).



Are there any indicators to evaluate the success of the lecture in ensuring that the student gains the maximum benefit?

Yes, there is more than one indicator I use in measuring the extent a student has benefited from the lecture.

• During the lecture

A students' commitment to time, non-preoccupation with mobile phones, active participation during the lecture, sitting in the front seats, careful recording of notes, and active participation during the lecture.

• After the lecture

Communicating with me about the subject even after graduating from the semester, retrieving lessons during daily life and extrapolating about them, application of skills by the student (parents and employees) and taking advantage of the ideas presented in lectures for scientific research, and, finally, checking the validity of the general information mentioned in the lecture.

Examinations

Examples that I mention in the lecture are not mentioned in the textbook or binding. Content of examinations is similar to my lectures in general.

Mr. Mohammed Nassar won third place in the competition. He is a lecturer in the Department of Public Law in the College of Law and has a lot of scientific and practical experience. He received a Bachelor's degree in Law from Al Zaytouna University in the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan in 2004 and a master's degree in law from Reading University in the UK in 2008. He also serves as Assistant Director of Administrative and Financial Affairs.

What are your plans to develop content of teaching methods to be more creative and interactive with students?

My development plan for the next academic year builds on what was accomplished in the previous year. I improve my current methods with new methods. For example, one of the things I am developing is the content on the e-learning system. It is to be balanced between the description of the course and the outputs required in line with the state of creative thinking that we seek in the students. I am also adding a programmable examination of human rights subject on the e-learning system along with improving the use of the electronic system's application on smart phones.

First Bahraini to receive PhD in Islamic Banks Accounting



Dr. Nadia Sharida

My doctoral thesis highlights one of the most important topics in the Islamic banking world

Dr. Nadia Abdul-Jabbar Al Sharida is a faculty member in the College of Administrative Sciences. She is the first Bahraini to obtain a PhD in Islamic Banks Accounting, awarded for her thesis entitled "The Effect of Compliance with the Requirements of the Standard of Presentation and Public Disclosure in the Financial Statements of Islamic Financial Institutions on Achieving Competitive Advantage (Comparative advantage): An applied study on Islamic banks in the Kingdom of Bahrain". She also holds a Fellowship Higher Education Academy (UK) and a Professional Certificate as Certified Trainer from the Institute of Cost and Management Accountants (ICCA) and Certified Sharia Advisor Auditor (CSAA).

We met with Dr. Nadia to learn more about the subject of her thesis and topics related to the thriving Islamic banking industry, including its impact on the economies of countries future in the Arab region and internationally.

First, tell us about your doctoral thesis and the fundamentals of Islamic banking.

My thesis highlights one of the most important topics in the Islamic banking world: the application of standards issued by the Accounting and Auditing Organisation for Islamic Financial Institutions (AAOIFI) based in the Kingdom of Bahrain. Islamic accounting standards, in my view, are a guide to the best methods of measuring and recording events and activities related to the work of Islamic financial institutions.

They contribute to the preparation of financial statements of these institutions in a standardised manner, presenting and disclosing information in a fair and transparent way. AAOIFI is a specialized The assets of the Islamic banking sector currently amount to more than US \$2 trillion worldwide

professional body which issues and reviews these standards according to the development of the Islamic financial industry and its surrounding environment.

The distinctive role of Islamic banks is not only measured by the range of services and products they provide, but also by their diligence when issuing financial statements and reports prepared in accordance with the relevant Islamic accounting standards. The needs of their users are met by providing them with reliable and objective information, reflecting the

high standards of transparency and clarity of the Islamic bank's results. These financial statements and reports are the main communication between the Islamic bank and its clients.

Diligent application of the latest accounting standards also makes it possible to compare the efficiency and performance of an Islamic bank against its competitors in the business world in an easy and transparent process.

We always hear about profitable banks and Islamic banks, what distinguishes Islamic banks from conventional banks?

Islamic banks have witnessed rapid development in line with all areas of economic and financial life. This reflects a glowing picture of the Islamic economy as an applied model, proving to the world its ability to avoid and be unaffected by financial crises. The evidence of its continued growth and spread is shown through independent Islamic bank branches and Islamic offices of conventional banks in European countries.

Islamic banks can be defined as "monetary financial institutions

not only to seek profit but also to achieve Islamic approach in transactions to contribute to the comprehensive development of society. Existing Islamic banks seek to achieve two objectives:

The first objective is specific to the Islamic bank being an economic unit wherein the funds of shareholders and depositors are invested in order to maximise and develop them. The second objective is the role of the Islamic bank as part of the macroeconomic system, focusing on the economic and social development of society through the selection of projects that:

- 1. Contribute to establish social projects such as hospitals, scientific institutes, and free healthcare.
- 2. Achieve justice in the distribution of wealth by providing means of financing for the beneficiaries of small producers and craftsmen. In addition, extending a helping hand to the needy, whether through donations or loans.
- 3. Develop handicrafts, environmental and small industries as an effective basis to improve economic and industrial structure in Islamic countries.
- 4. Achieve social solidarity among individuals through various social activities.



with economic, social, and ethical objectives that seek to mobilize resources and employ them in projects that comply with the principles of Islamic Sharia. An Islamic bank is committed to not practicing usury and achieving economic development and prosperity for the Islamic community".

The most important feature distinguishing Islamic banks from conventional banks is their reliance on the principle of participation in profit and loss. This avoids the practice of usury (banking interest) unlike traditional banks that rely on the interest-bearing system. Conventional banks only offer their customers loans with interest formulas, advertising these with different names. Islamic banks offer multiple legal formulas based on real buying and selling, i.e. exchanging money for an existing commodity.

Islamic banks also deal within the limits of the funds they have and do not use them in prohibited activities. Conventional banks are often not committed in their transactions and investments under Islamic law, resulting in economic problems such as inflation and economic crises.

What is Islamic banking based on?

Islamic banks seek to achieve a set of economic and social goals in accordance with the principles of Islamic Sharia. The aim is

Investment of funds occupies a large part of an Islamic bank's transactions, for which they use legitimate and multiple means of formulas that lead to capital cooperation. Islamic banks bear the risk of investment, unlike traditional banks that attach great importance to lending operations at the expense of investment. Investments of Islamic banks also require them to own fixed assets, unlike conventional banks which cannot because of ownership prohibition.

Islamic banks also play a distinctive social role within the framework of achieving social solidarity through their contribution to solving problems faced by society such as the problem of housing through the provision of loans, donations, and zakat.

In line with their special social role, Islamic banks practice the principles of mercy, tolerance, and ease called for by the Islamic Sharia when assisting the insolvent and giving grace periods. Traditional banks usually charge riba-based fines or worse: seizure of the debtor's assets and selling them at auctions.

On the cultural level, Islamic banks pay special importance to supporting, enriching, and spreading Islamic economic thought. Participation and preparation of meetings and conferences, as well as issuing and publishing research, studies, and books dealing with banking and the Islamic economy, helps to develop awareness of Islamic banking.

How do you evaluate the outlook for Islamic banking?

Islamic banks have become a prominent player in Islamic countries' economy. They are also striving to become a significant presence not only in Islamic nations but also in the rest of the world.

The Islamic banking sector is witnessing growth not only in the Arab and Islamic regions but also at the global level. This model continues to attract confidence and credibility as it meets the needs of customers while being unaffected by global financial crises.

According to the Islamic Development Bank (IDB), assets of the Islamic banking sector currently amount to more than US \$2 trillion worldwide. A steady growth rate is expected so that it will reach an estimated US \$6 trillion by 2020, giving us an optimistic view of the industry in the future.

Do you think that the Kingdom of Bahrain needs to raise more awareness of the Islamic banking sector? How can it be used to serve the Bahraini economy?

The Kingdom of Bahrain is one of few countries that took the initiative a long time ago to develop the Islamic banking industry in the region. This is evidenced by the Kingdom hosting various international conferences and seminars aimed at developing the Islamic banking industry. A recent one was the Social Responsibility Award in Islamic Banks, which I participated in and in which I received a certificate of honour for contributing effectively in the management of the conference sessions and research participation.

The Kingdom of Bahrain, is second only to Malaysia, in providing an attractive location for the Islamic banking industry because of its business environment providing important incentives and facilities, and thus leading to a positive impact on the national economy.

The ICD-Thomson Reuters Islamic Financial Development Index also noted that the Kingdom of Bahrain is the most advanced

Islamic banking market in the Middle East and second in the world.

The Kingdom of Bahrain has established its position as a regional hub for the Islamic banking industry. It is one of the leading countries that embraced this industry since its inception. The Kingdom currently is home to the largest group of Islamic banks, including five banks ranked among the top 15 Islamic banks in the world. It also hosts many organisations and institutions interested in developing the structure of the Islamic banking sector at the organisational and legal level. Coming at the head of these institutions are: International Islamic Financial Market (IIFM), The Accounting and Auditing Organisation for Islamic Financial Institutions, the Thomson Reuters Global Islamic Finance Center, Ernst & Young Islamic Banking Group, The International Islamic Rating Agency (IIRA) and other financial institutions.

The presence of such institutions, together with the Islamic banks themselves, has made Bahrain one of the leading countries in the Islamic banking industry. Bahrain has also become a leading market for Islamic bonds (sukuk) including short term government bonds and Ijara instruments.

Bahrain's Central Bank (CBB) played a key role in introducing these innovative products. The latest CBB statistics revealed that the assets of the Islamic banking sector in the Kingdom of Bahrain reached about US \$26 billion and the number of Islamic banks reached 26. These figures reflect Bahrain's ability to occupy an leading position among the countries most involved in the Islamic finance industry. Thanks to the awareness and understanding of the Kingdom's wise leadership, the vision and strategy focusing on the importance of the banking industry positively impacts the economy of the Kingdom.

How does the subject of your doctoral thesis influence your students? What is the benefit that can be gained from this discipline?

We in the College of Administrative Sciences are keen to implement the latest Islamic accounting standards. Students are offered, in both English and Arabic, training in the latest Islamic accounting standards applied in Islamic banks.

The College works diligently to keep abreast with all that is new and advanced in the field, providing the labour market with skilled employees capable of working in Islamic banks.

I also offer training workshops in cooperation with the University's Training Centre on the methods of applying the latest Islamic accounting standards. These are used by a large number of employees in the Islamic banking industry.
