## Message from a Colleague Teaching Criminal Law: an innovative approach

When we teach our students, we aim to help them successfully achieve the learning outcomes of their courses. I am personally using a variety of approved teaching and learning methods, depending on the type of module and the learners, which to a large extent is influenced by my own experiences and style.

The criminal law cases are considered as rigid and lengthy with many details. As a result, some students feel bored and lose focus in the classroom. For this reason, I use a variety of methods, such as providing students in the classroom with cases from YouTube and other video sources so they could learn to analyze the elements of the case and the applications of the law. First, they worked with these resources individually and later in small groups, giving feeding back to the whole group. This made my class more enjoyable and interesting and helped students to achieve much higher outcomes when compared with the results of students in previous classes. In addition, the students reported that they were thoroughly satisfied with the new methods and demanded they should be expanded to other courses.

The study of criminal law requires students to be trained how to think and analyse as a future lawyer. Consequently, I push students to think, through unexpected questions that prompt them to think deeply and I develop their mental abilities through in-depth and accurate study of cases (real cases and virtual) and theory by discussing the issues and references in the classroom.

The method that I found to be appropriate in guiding and supporting students in Criminal Law is a simulation technique. I tend to choose a specific issue and determine the roles of students to be played in the class. Depending on the objective of the activity, I choose a real case, and make some appropriate modifications in order to give students the chance to learn about the actual and real decisions made in court. In the mock trial, there is more preparation, but I've found it very worthwhile. Papers are distributed to the students, and the text component, roles are allocated for judges, lawyers, prosecutors, defendants, and witnesses. I set up a description of the case and distribute it to the students for each role. I make sure that the students with the most important roles have the ability to communicate in order to clarify and choose the best direction in which to go. Using a mock court as a learning environment ensures students cover all ILOs and how to apply the law. I have found that this work makes students feel engaged and motivated. In fact, they always take many pictures in order to keep the good memories. To me, this demonstrates their enjoyment and interest in learning.

I observed over my many years of teaching at ASU that some of my students are too shy to ask questions or participate in the classroom, thus I came up with a special way to engage them in class tasks gently, in a step-by-step non-threatening way, which resulted in greater participation. To successfully achieve the learning outcomes, I believe in dealing with students politely, and not embarrassing them in front of their classmates so that there will be goodwill on the students' part to participate in lectures and sometimes need to use positive and appropriate humor.

The new technology is a big part of the learner's daily life. It is inevitable that teaching and learning methods should include E-learning instruments to make the learning process more enjoyable, especially that most of our students are so young and very used to technology and that's why we use it in all our classes.

In the last semester and because of COVID-19 we totally switched to online teaching. The ASU's E- Infrastructure and available resources including Moodle have helped immensely in enjoying a new experience. The online experience was useful and helpful to our students. For instance, it provided students with the opportunity to attend lectures and listen to them again as they are recorded. Also, I noticed an increase in the achievement of learning outcomes. Similarly, it was a rich experience for faculty, who are now more familiar with the possibilities of Moodle and have used new teaching and assessment methods. I believe that after COVID-19, online teaching will be widespread and become more accepted. This topic can be covered in future articles inshallah.
