Welcome to the 13th issue of the 4th year of the President's News Digest. In this issue of the News Digest, I will address the subject of "strategic planning in the higher education sector".





According to the (US) Society for College and University Planning (SCUP), a strategic plan for a higher education institution is a continuous process that aims to achieve a full engagement culture inside the organization that would lead it to excellence.

Mission, vision, values, strategic goals and implementation plans including KPIs need to be addressed as part of developing a strategic plan. Techniques such as environmental scanning, SWOT analysis, brainstorming workshops and existing relevant documentation could be used to develop such a plan. Various stakeholders should be involved in developing the strategic plan. BOT members, staff, students, advisory board members, students' council, industry representatives, alumni and others could be used as part of the consultation process.

A full alignment between the University, Colleges and Departments, and the individuals working in the University should be achieved. This is illustrated in the included diagram.

1. Tell us about yourself: (Your childhood, academic background)

I was born in Baghdad, and my childhood was wonderful with a big family. I got married right after I completed my Secondary school. This pushed me to handle more responsibilities, but with a big support from my husband. I completed both my Bachelor and Master degrees from the University of Baghdad, and was ranked first amongst my fellows. During my stay in Bahrain, I worked as faculty member in the Accounting Department at Gulf University for 3 years. In addition, I am the first woman from Bahrain, who became a Certified Cost Accountant from ICCA in 2013. I joined Applied Science University in in the same year.

After I got my 3 children, I decided to pursue my postgraduate education, and in Jan. 2018, I got my PhD in Accounting of Islamic Banks from World Islamic Sciences University. My thesis is titled "The Impact of commitment to requirements of General presentation and disclosure standard on achieving competitive advantage (An applied study in Kingdom of Bahrain Islamic banks". This is the first PhD done in Accounting Islamic Standards in Bahrain. Several months back, I completed the Higher Education Academy Application, and I have become HEA Fellow with the support of my University. Finally, last September, I passed the International Exam and became a certified Shari'a Adviser & Auditor (CSAA.), and became AAOIFI-CSAA fellow member. This Certificate stands as an important international professional Certificate in the Islamic Banking Industry.
